### Liturgical Reflection on the Revised Missal:

## Scripture and the Mass

With the revised translation of the *Roman Missal*, the priest or deacon will engage the people in the following dialogue: *The Lord be with you;* Response: *And with your spirit.* The first words (of the priest and deacon) come from a greeting of Boaz, the great-great-grandfather of King David: “Boaz said, “The Lord be with you” (Ruth 2:4). The people’s response reflects the language of Saint Paul. The Apostle says, “The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit” (Galatians 6:18). To Timothy Saint Paul ends with, “The Lord be with your spirit” (2 Timothy 4:22). And to the Philippians he ends with, “The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit” (Philippians 4:23). The new language will more directly reflect the biblical understanding that, through Baptism, the Spirit of God dwells in us and unites us as one Body in Christ.

## This Week's Saints

**MONDAY † Saint Benedict of Nursia** (born 480) is considered the father of Western monasticism. Saddened by the immoral state of society, he became a hermit. His charismatic personality and way of life attracted other men; eventually the group of monks moved near Naples where he laid out fundamentals of monastic life, now known as the *The Rule of Saint Benedict*: the primary occupation of the monk is to pray the Divine Office with a life of stability, obedience, and conversion of life.

**WEDNESDAY † Saint Henry** (born 972), son of the duke and duchess of Bavaria, was crowned Holy Roman Emperor by Pope Benedict VIII. He was fond of the monastic vocation and supported monasteries whenever possible. He claimed he was miraculously cured of an illness by Saint Benedict; he, along with Saint Frances of Rome, is considered the patron of Benedictine Oblates.

**THURSDAY † Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha** (1656–1680), called the “Lily of the Mohawks,” is the first Native American to have been beatified, and is on the way to possible canonization as a saint. The daughter of a Mohawk chief and a Christian Algonquin woman, she vowed to live as a virgin, and eventually decided to convert to Christianity after encounters with Jesuit missionaries. Her decision to convert was not well received within her community because Christianity was seen as the religion of the oppressors. A pious woman, she attended daily Mass, fasted frequently, taught children, and cared for the sick. After she died, a number of miracles and visions were attributed to her intercession.

**FRIDAY † Saint Bonaventure** (1221–1274), known as the “Seraphic Doctor,” was elected minister general of the Franciscan order after the death of Saint Francis. He helped guide the friars through some divisive issues surrounding poverty and the role of education. Later he was elected Archbishop of York and took an active part in the Second Council of Lyons, which sought to heal the division between the Eastern and Western Churches.

**SATURDAY † Memorial of Our Lady of Mount Carmel.** Mount Carmel, part of a mountain range in northern Israel, has a biblical association with the prophet Elijah. In the twelfth century, the Carmelites were founded, and eventually built a monastery, at a site that was supposedly Elijah’s cave. For this reason, the Carmelites honor the Blessed Virgin Mary under this title. The English Carmelite Saint Simon Stock is believed to have been given the brown scapular by Our Lady of Mount Carmel, and those who wear it believe they can be sure of her help at the hour of their death.
